

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## Mayor's Message

A lot has happened since my last message, and I am pleased to report that the City continues to experience investment and growth, with 108 building permits issued for 2024 to

date. As of October 15, the City issued 100 new business licences this year, bringing the total to 1,111. Construction of the urgent and primary care center is anticipated to commence soon, the Glen Arbor expansion is expected to be complete in mid-2025, and plans for the water treatment plant are underway.

The 96th Annual Williams Lake Stampede was an immense success again this year, and we were pleased to have Dale Taylor recognized as honourary parade marshal. As always, we owe a huge debt of gratitude to the many volunteers and organizations who make the Stampede events such a success year after year.

Over the summer, I joined members of Council for the Tsqewt specific claims victory celebration in Esk'et. We were pleased to commemorate their landmark settlement to ensure reparations for the historical loss of water rights – a process that took 21 years. As well, I attended the Tsilhqot'in National Government's war chief memorial in July. We are honoured to stand with Indigenous neighbours in the spirit of partnership and reconciliation.

As most of us are well aware, on July 21st, the City of Williams Lake activated its Emergency Operations Centre in response to the River Valley Wildfire. I am sure the entire community echoes my deepest gratitude to all of the organizations and individuals involved for their quick and focused response to this emergency. The City continues to focus on emergency preparedness and

disaster risk reduction. The City received grant funding from the Province's Community Emergency Preparedness Fund to support our community in disaster risk reduction, climate adaptation and hazard and vulnerability risk assessment. Funding was also received to enhance the Fairview Drive emergency booster station.

The City of Williams Lake was honoured to be part of the official unveiling of the "Every Child Matters" Crosswalk in our downtown in September. The crosswalk is a beautiful reminder of the power of relationships and coming together in the spirit of reconciliation, and was made possible in partnership with the Orange Shirt Society, Cariboo Friendship Society, Williams Lake First Nation, and provincial grant funding.

I was also honoured to be invited to attend the Cattlemen's Association AGM again this year. It is always an informative event, and I thank the Cattlemen's Association for their ongoing stewardship and commitment to best practices.

The Union of BC Municipalities convention in September was a good opportunity for the City's delegates to advocate for Williams Lake. We had many productive meetings and will continue to advocate for businesses in our entire region.

As I write this, we are heading into the Business Excellence Awards. I am looking forward to celebrating all of the businesses who were nominated for a Business Excellence Award this year! Thank you all for your investment in Williams Lake – I appreciate each and every business in our community.

our shared vision of enhancing the quality of life for all. We are preparing for the next phase of our projects and the exciting opportunities it will bring.



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
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# MERCANTILE & REFILLERY

Dani Gastaldello is a young, environmentally conscious 'hippie' who moved from Vancouver Island and has made the Cariboo her home since relocating here for the second time in 2013. She is dedicated to her vision, passion, and commitment to creating a cleaner, healthier planet for her children. Her business, NEXT GENeral Mercantile + Refillery, has been operating since November 2020 and is preparing to celebrate its fourth anniversary. Initially located in Delainey's Mall on Oliver Street, NGMR moved to a new spot on Third Ave N last year after Christmas.



Customers can obtain containers, lids, and dispensers for their refills or bring their own from home. Dani is committed to elevating recycling efforts by focusing on reducing plastic usage from the start. Since its inception, NGMR has successfully prevented over 350,000 pieces of plastic from entering the community through its refill initiatives and by offering a wide range of plastic-free alternatives for everyday products. The store also features items such as baby products, jewelry, dog treats, beeswax food wraps, reusable bags, and upcycled second-hand clothing from a company in Kelowna, along with a significant selection of products from local vendors.

In running her store, she has prioritized connecting with quality local vendors to minimize the carbon footprint associated with transporting products over long distances and to support local artisans. Over 90% of the store's inventory comes from small businesses

in BC and Canada, with the majority being women-owned companies.

The NGMR team also provides a platform for local vendors to sell their goods. "I seek out individuals who share my vision—those who strive to reduce waste before it reaches my store. I look for products that are transparent in their practices, free from parabens and toxins, and offer fragrance-free options," she noted. The store also emphasizes the importance of education, providing resources and information to help customers make informed choices about their

purchases and the impact of their consumption on the environment.

Dani's commitment to sustainability extends beyond just the products offered in her store. She actively engages with the community through events like the bi-annual clothing swap hosted with neighbouring business Thriftbucket, hosting workshops in the new location, and social media, encouraging others to adopt eco-friendly practices in their daily lives. By fostering a sense of community and shared responsibility, she hopes to inspire more people to join the movement towards a cleaner, healthier planet.

As NEXT GENeral Mercantile + Refillery approaches its fourth anniversary, Dani reflects on the journey so far and the positive changes she has witnessed in her community. She is proud of the impact her business has made in reducing plastic waste and promoting sustainable living. With plans for future growth and new initiatives, Dani remains dedicated to her mission of creating a better world for future generations.



### **Recruitment & Retention Planning Session:**

## **Shaping the Future of Williams Lake**



On September 4, 2024, the Williams Lake & District Chamber of Commerce, in collaboration with the City of Williams Lake and the Cariboo Regional District, hosted a Recruitment & Retention Planning Session at Signal Point. This four-hour event brought together 38 community members to discuss strategies for attracting new residents to Williams Lake and retaining them long-term.

#### **Recruitment & Retention Initiatives**

An overview of current efforts was shared, emphasizing the importance of coordinated community strategies to enhance recruitment and retention in the region.

### **Survey Results: What Newcomers Love About Williams Lake**

Recent survey data was presented, highlighting key factors that attract new residents, such as affordable housing, job opportunities, and the area's small-town charm.

#### What Makes Williams Lake Special?

Participants engaged in a brainstorming session, identifying some of the unique qualities that make Williams Lake an attractive place to live and work. Key highlights included:

- Location: Central, with a rural lifestyle and short commutes.
- Job Opportunities: A strong local economy with opportunities for

career growth.

- Education: A local university campus offering diverse learning opportunities.
- Outdoor Activities: Year-round options like skiing, mountain biking, fishing, and hiking.
- Affordability: Beyond housing, Williams Lake offers an overall lower cost of living.
- **Community:** A welcoming atmosphere with a sense of belonging.

To move forward, participants proposed actionable steps that could be implemented locally to enhance recruitment and retention:

- Launching a **Good Neighbour Program** to foster community connections.
- Positive Community Messaging to challenge misconceptions and highlight the benefits of life in Williams Lake.
- Developing a Welcome Package for Families to help newcomers integrate quickly.
- Expanding educational programs, including micro-credentials.
- **Beautification Projects** to enhance the visual appeal of the downtown area.
- Affordable Housing Initiatives to ensure diverse and accessible housing options.



- Collaborating to create a Young Professionals Network aimed at retaining young graduates.
- Establishing Multipurpose Recreation Facility for year-round community use.

Participants selected eight key priorities to focus on over the next 1-2 years:

- 1. Good Neighbour Program
- 2. Welcome Package for Families
- 3. Grow Your Own Program / **Common Landing Place**
- 4. Change the Narrative
- 5. Affordable Housing
- 6. Daycare Expansion
- 7. Young Professionals Network
- 8. Multipurpose Recreation Facility


The Recruitment & Retention Working Group will continue to develop these initiatives and provide regular updates during the Chamber's monthly

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# Celebrating Indigenous Culture and Community Engagement

As a proud Secwépemc from the Esk'etemc nation, my role as Special Projects Coordinator at the Visitor Centre has allowed me to immerse myself in promoting Indigenous culture and traditions. My dedication to weaving these elements into the visitor experience has fostered stronger connections between

Indigenous communities and those who come to learn and engage.

This past season has been transformative, marked by events that celebrated Indigenous resilience, creativity and artist expression. On National Indigenous Day, I joined the community in celebration, witnessing the rich cultural expressions that bring people together. The Tourism Discovery Centre hosted an Indigenous Market that created an important platform for artisans and vendors to showcase traditional crafts, highlighting the importance of cultural preservation and economic empowerment. Attending the Métis Music Fest deepened my appreciation for how music unifies Indigenous identities. I also helped with the Williams Lake



First Nation Competition Pow Wow as part of my community engagement, further enriching my understanding of Indigenous culture

I took in the Tweedsmuir flight tour, I gained a deeper appreciation for the profound connection Indigenous communities have with their land. Soaring over the Painted Mountains and Monarch Ice Fields,

remembering stories brought the landscape to life, revealing its rich history and cultural significance. With a bird's-eye view, you can see the connection between the territories of the Nuxalk, Tsilhqot'in, Dakelh, and Secwepemc.

One of the most enriching experiences this year was my visit to the Xatśūll Heritage Site. It was here that I felt a profound connection between the Secwepemc people and our ancestral lands, broadening my understanding of the significance of these relationships. Similarly, attending the 10-year anniversary of the Tsilhqot'in Nation's historic title win strengthened my commitment to Indigenous land rights and the ongoing struggle for recognition and sovereignty.

Another powerful moment was witnessing a



blanket ceremony at an Indigenous celebration honoring elders in a historic land title win. I learned the importance of acknowledging the wisdom and experience passed down through generations. During Orange Shirt Day, I stood in solidarity with residential school survivors, supporting healing and reconciliation through drum songs and ceremony.

My involvement in the March with Arch event offered an opportunity to support public awareness and solidarity for reconciliation and justice through music, stories, and social media engagement. These moments continue to shape my approach to creating culturally respectful spaces at the Visitor Centre. I am in the process of designing a sacred space that will feature a welcome sign in the three primary languages of our local nations, enhancing the cultural richness of the area. Drawing from firsthand experiences with Indigenous traditions, I aim to create a space

where visitors can gain a deeper understanding and appreciation for these sacred practices.

One of the key projects I've been working on is the preservation and integration of Indigenous languages. Through visits with Elders and language keepers in the Secwepemc, Tsilhqot'in, and Dakelh communities, I've gained a deeper appreciation for the richness of their languages and cultures. My goal is to incorporate these languages into the Tourism Discovery Centre, tourism website, social media, and brochures, celebrating the voices of our collective heritage. By integrating these languages into the visitor experience, we not only honour the wisdom of our Elders but also offer guests an authentic connection to the land and its stories, ensuring that this invaluable legacy is shared and appreciated by future generations.

offerings of the Cariboo, helping to boost local tourism and economic growth.


